FROM THE DESK OF FR. GLASS:

The Catholic imagination.

Then standing at the door of the temple, Catherine reasoned at length with the Emperor, using every sort of argument, syllogistic, allegorical, metaphorical, logical and transcendental. — The Golden Legend.

St. Catherine of Alexandria is one of my favorite Saints. I first encountered her when I was living in St. Catharines, where the Cathedral is dedicated to her. This Cathedral, by the way, has now been beautifully restored. Later, I came across her story in 'The Golden Legend', a medieval collection of the lives of the Saints.

Catherine, we are told, is a young Christian woman of noble birth who, in the early 4th century, confronts the Emperor Maxentius on the steps of the pagan temple. Having no answer to her arguments against paganism, he sends for fifty wise men to debate with her. They are all converted. In the end the Emperor is unable to overcome Catherine's wisdom and eloquence, and he has her killed. This account of the life and martyrdom of St. Catherine is legend rather than history. Yet, her story has always been a rich for source for the religious and artistic imagination.

After the Second Vatican Council, in the 1960's, the Liturgical Calendar was reformed. Sadly, the reform was put into the hands of those for whom everything must be strictly logical and literal. Any Saint who lacked a firm historical basis was eliminated, including Catherine, Christopher, and Valentine. An exception was made for the Saints mentioned in the Mass, e.g., Lucy and Cecilia.

C. S. Lewis once described religions as being like soup, being either 'clear' or 'thick.' Some are philosophical and intellectual: clear broth. Others are rich in mythology and symbolism: thick minestrone. Lewis notes that Christianity is both. We have both intellectual clarity of St. Thomas Aquinas, and the rich mysticism of Julian of Norwich.

The Christian imagination also abounds with legendary tales: St. Christopher carrying the Christ child across the river on his shoulder; St. Nicholas secretly giving gifts to those in need. The loss of these stories makes us poorer. Yes, there is a difference between fact and fiction, but we are capable of making that distinction. We can say, "Here is what we know historically about the Saint," and "Here is the legend that is told about him." Catholic culture has always allowed wide scope for the imagination.

St. Catherine, for me, is a great model of the evangelist and preacher. When she confronts the Emperor, she does so boldly, and she pulls out all the stops. Her arguments are not only 'syllogistic," and 'logical,' but also 'allegorical', 'metaphorical', and 'transcendental.'

Thankfully, Pope John Paul II rescued St. Catherine from oblivion and reinstated her feast day as an optional memorial on November 25th.


